Philosophy 305 Ancient Greek Philosophy

I. PURPOSE OF THE COURSE

- <u>Content goals</u>: acquire a durable understanding of influential views held by the ancient Greeks concerning human nature, knowledge, the structure of reality, and the good life.
- <u>Skills goals</u>: strengthen analytical reading, argument (re-)construction and evaluation, and written and oral communication skills, working with classical texts in and out of class.
- <u>Dispositional goals</u>: develop intellectual receptivity to modes of thinking and expression that differ strongly from our native modes; willingness to countenance and seriously consider views that might appear to be naïve or otherwise obviously defective.

II. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

A. <u>Class-prep questions</u> posted on the course site to aid your reading and give us a starting-point for class discussion. Responses may be submitted either by email or in hard-copy; in either form, only responses received by the beginning of class are eligible for credit. Bring an extra copy of your responses to class, whether on paper or a laptop, to refer to and revise in the course of class discussion. Since an important part of your job is to determine through discussion how good your answers are, I typically will not return the copy you submit. However, it can be helpful to receive some direct feedback on the adequacy of your response, and so I will return up to three of your submissions with comments and corrections – please indicate clearly on your paper that you want it to be returned. Credit for prep questions is awarded on the basis of the following criterion: *if your responses provide clear evidence of a good-faith effort to answer all of the questions to the best of your ability, you'll receive full-credit; otherwise, you'll receive no credit.* There will be 25 sets of prep questions. Grades are assigned as follows:

Prep questions constitute **20%** of the final course grade.

- B. <u>Short Assessments</u>. Approximately five in number. These include brief quizzes and other in-class work of various kinds, designed to reinforce understanding of central concepts, diagnose potential points of confusion, and offer skills-building opportunities. Unlike the prep questions, these are graded for correctness. I'll drop your lowest score. The remaining assessments constitute **20%** of the final course grade.
- C. <u>Exams</u>. You will be examined on each of the three divisions under III below. The first exam is inclass, the second take-home, and the third in-class at the scheduled time of the final exam. In determining exam marks, a premium will be placed on correctness, completeness, clarity of expression, conciseness, and philosophical sophistication. The first exam is worth 10% of the final course grade, while the second and third are worth 25% each, for a total of **60%**.

Final grades are calculated according to the University's Grading System (see p. 34of the 2017-18 catalog).
