TRANSPORTATION MODE SHIFT

Team: Vanessa Fry, Matthew May, Gabe Osterhout, and Emily Pape

IPI has begun a project with the City of Boise looking at mode shift from single-occupancy vehicles to other forms of transportation. The report will outline modes of transportation currently used by Treasure Valley residents, the profile of individuals most likely to shift modes, and how mode shift can be encouraged in cities such as Boise. While currently reviewing existing literature on the barriers, drivers, and best practices of mode shift, the team is also meeting with representatives from the City to provide updates on a weekly basis.

DIAGNOSTIC SITE VISIT RESEARCH PLAN

The diagnostic site visit project is an extension of the Bluum Communities of Excellence CSP Grant evaluation. McAllister Hall travelled to Colorado at the beginning of the month to observe a site visit of a charter school also receiving CSP Grant funds. IPI is now preparing to conduct its own visits by creating evaluation standards and interview protocols that will capture the data needed to evaluate the schools receiving CSP funds from Bluum. These visits will observe everything about the school from curriculum and instruction to governance and finance to help schools identify their strengths and areas for growth. The eventual product will synthesize the common practices of schools with high stakeholder satisfaction, as well as, high test scores to provide improved resources for other schools.

IDAHO'S TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDING

IPI researchers presented a draft financial model for the transportation infrastructure to stakeholders. The team also shared a draft of an interactive map that indicates policy alternatives deployed across the U.S. The team continues to research the state of existing infrastructure, including public transportation and bike and pedestrian infrastructure.

MONTH IN REVIEW

WORKING REMOTELY

On March 13, Boise State University moved all of its courses online. At this time, many areas of campus, including the School of Public Service, encouraged faculty and staff to work remotely to fight the spread of COVID-19. The Idaho Policy Institute was well positioned to do so and implemented working remotely immediately. It hasn't slowed us down, though, and IPI is now conducting a weekly staff meeting via Zoom and has integrated five-minute lightning talks into these meetings.

VANESSA FRY FEATURED ON TWO HOUSING PANELS

Vanessa Fry attended the Idaho Conference on Housing and Economic Development on March 3. Vanessa spoke on a housing and healthcare panel which featured experts who shared proven links between access to healthcare and positive housing outcomes. They discussed resources and highlighted opportunities for cooperation. Vanessa spoke specifically about the use of data to identify the impacts homelessness and substandard housing can have on individuals' health and the associated public costs. She also gave a brief report on New Path Community Housing. She was joined by Jennifer Palagi from St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center, who spoke about the social determinants of health and why health systems are investing in housing, and Kendra Lutes from Terry Reilly Health Services, who spoke from the clinical perspective of housing as healthcare and the issues she and her colleagues most often see in unstably housed clients. Deanna Watson, from the Boise City/Ada County Housing Authorities, moderated the discussion.

Vanessa also spoke at the Urban Land Institute Idaho conference on March 4. There, she was on a panel that discussed opportunities to adjust policy to encourage more affordable housing in the area.

CHANGES IN BOISE'S SUPPORTIVE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT

New Path Community Housing, Idaho's first permanent supportive housing development, passed its first-year anniversary. IPI is currently working to complete an evaluation for New Path Community Housing. The New Path leaders have decided to make a few changes in order to improve their facility to best benefit their more than 40 residents. At the Idaho Conference on Housing and Economic Development, they were able to review both the success of the project and the adjustments that need to take place. Some of the recommended adjustments included an increase in night-shift staff in order to provide more assistance for the residents.

IDAHO PRESS ARTICLE ON LATINO VOTING BEHAVIOR

Gabe Osterhout was quoted in an Idaho Press article, "What does the Latino vote look like in Idaho?" about Latino voting behavior and turnout. According to Osterhout, Latino voter turnout jumped 13 percentage points during the 2018 midterm elections. In Idaho, voting trends for Latinos are difficult to track because there is no exit polling in the state that identifies voter ethnicity. Osterhout attempted to estimate Latino voting behaviors by analyzing eight Idaho counties where the overall population is at least 25 percent Latino. In an email, Osterhout is quoted "A quick look at numbers from prior elections suggests that 2018 was the first election in several years that most of those eight counties underperformed the rest of the state in terms of turnout, I'm still digging deeper into the data to understand why that is the case."
